


All these af rm that the university makes profound long-term decisions which will reward it greatly in the future.

The College of Nursing (CON) garners 100% passing rate for f rst t me takers in the most recent Nursing Board Examinat on. The results, released on June 10, 2022 by the Professional Regulat on Commission (PRC), show 6,616 examinees passed out of 9,729.

The 2022 results demonstrate CON's 5year passing streak from 2016 to 2022.

"Our clean slate in the Nursing Board Examinat ons at ests to the quality of our programs in the CON. We give careful at ent on to quality of instruct on and assessment," said Dean Catalina Febes T. Aranas, Ph.D. during the Nursing Faculty Training and Workshop on Curriculum Mapping last July 20 to 21.

"Our current curriculum map already

conforms to standards. But our commitment to continuous development pushes us to do more. We are currently reviewing its contents for updating and integration of more vigorous strategies for instruction and assessment guided by the alignment framework. Instructional planning and design are indispensable in the at ainment of desired learning outcomes," said Dean Aranas. "These are crucial in the preparation of our students for the Nursing Board Examination," she added.

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(AQAF). The appointment is made by the prest gious ASEAN Quality Assurance Network (AQAN), Malaysia.

the ASEAN Quality Assurance Framework

Dr. Bustamante is the first Bedan Administrator to receive such recognition among few Filipino education administrators.

AQAN is a network of 10 nat onal quality assurance authorities and ministries responsible for higher education among the ASEAN member countries, namely Brunei Darussalam, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam.

The endeavor to develop an ASEAN Quality Assurance Framework for Higher Education (AQAFHE) was conceived in October 2011 in the AQAN Roundtable Meeting held in Bandar Seri Begawan.

The AQAFHE seeks to promote regional harmonizat on in higher education by developing a quality assurance framework in higher education with regional identities where the ASEAN countries could benchmark and align their quality assurance systems 5 of higher education. The framework serves as a common reference point for quality assurance agencies and higher education institutions in the region as universities navigate harmony amid diversity in systems, cultures, and traditions.


# SBU HONORS SERVICE AWARDEES on the Feast of St. Benedict

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
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San Beda University commits to providing an opportunity for qualified students to earn a college degree and become a productive global citizen. To date, a total of 148 students are recipients of the University's academic scholarship program. As scholars, they are expected to have except onal performance in academics. These scholars are stewarded by various guidance of ces in the University depending on the College they belong.

Based on the prof le released on June 15, 2022 by the Of ce of the Vice President for Academics, led by Dr. Divina Edralin, and the Guidance Of ces in the Inst tuton, most academic scholars are enrolled in the Integrated Basic Educat on Department.

These quarant ne measures, or popularly known as "lockdowns," led schools to close and stop its operations and activities. The Covid-19 pandemic caused unprecedented disruptions to education. Schools had to cope with these disruptions to continue their educational mis-


Aloysius Ma. A Maranan, OSB, conducted internal organizat onal assessment, planned appropriate programs, as well as aligned its resources and processes to fervently prepare the delivery of transformat ve educat on in a virtual environment. As a result of these, the University immediately bolstered its learning management system, the REDCANVAS, for the delivery of online learning. This was augmented by other online plat orms like MS

spiritual needs of students, faculty, and staf of the university by organizing the daily online recitation of the Holy Rosary, monthly masses, devotional holy hour in front of the Blessed Sacrament, and even online recollections.

To address the documentary needs of students, The University Registrar's Of ce shif ed to alternat ve online system and procedure using Of ce 365, Power Automate and Outlook programs in processing the requests for Of cial Transcript of Records, Copy of Grades, and Diploma as well as in the enrollment of students. The Accounting Of ce has expanded the University's payment channels by engaging the payment gateway services of Paynamics Technologies Inc.

The St. Bede Mushroom and Vegetable Growers Associat on is a community-based organizat on which is a recipient of the community development program of SBU, part cularly the livelihood program since 2012. During the pandemic, the product on of mushrooms and potato chips stopped due to restrict ons imposed by the government, and the associat on members had to look for an alternative source of income.

Last February 2022, SBU and SBCBEFI visited the associat on to discuss concerns and gather updates on the associat on's progress. Since June 2022, the group resumed selling potato chips at the Pasalubong Center of the Municipality of Bauko.

The Holy Family Catholic Mission (HFCM) signed its frst Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the Inst tuton in 2014. Having such a harmonious partnership, the HFCM and today's San Beda University (SBU) renewed the MOA on July 12, 2018, ef ect ve for two (2) years unt I July 12, 2020. In

March 2020, the Philippine Government imposed a lockdown covering the entre Metro Manila because of the Covid-19 virus, leaving drast c changes and adjustments to institutions, especially schools, hence the delay in the renewal of the MOA.

The MOA is tripart te involving SBCBE-FI. The partnership, signed on June 10, 2022, ef ect ve for three years, is now a partnership of three inst tut ons with a common goal. On the same day, SBCBEFI donated a laptop, laptop bag, and printer to HFCM. Meanwhile, the College of Arts and Sciences – Nat onal Service Training Program donated 25 reams of Copier Paper.

SBCBEFI also donated school supplies to Pact I Elementary School. Teacher Juanita T. Awakan received the turnover of the school supplies in St. Benedict Chapel in Sit o Pact I.


As a learning inst tut on, SBU continues its journey towards sustainability focusing on Sustainable Development Goal 4 (SDG 4) or Quality Educa-

The prest gious ASEAN Citat on Index (ACI) hails San Beda University's Scient a Journal. Scient a, the University's mult-disciplinary journal, is recipient of the Award of Merit 2022 by the ACI.

The ACI, a central regional database, was designed to index all bibliographic records and the citat ons of all quality ASEAN research outputs which appeared in the ASEAN scholarly journals. Brunei Darussalam, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam comprise the ACI. Its Board meets twice a year in each member country to share experiences, monitor performance, and discuss developments pert nent to it.

The ACI increases the visibility of research product vity from Southeast Asia while at the same t me helps improve the university ranking of universities in the region. Moreover, publications, citations, H-index and other bibliometric indexes of ASEAN research outputs generated by the ACI is crucial to the integration of ASEAN research performance evaluation in the national, regional, and international levels.
